Hello US Citizen Services,

I am a US citizen and I was told to contact this email address by the US embassy in London (and the FBI in the US) for an appointment with a federal officer to report a crime that takes place in the US.

The crime puts a person (me) at risk of bodily harm and injury so I am in asylum (recently registered asylum with the Home Office) in the UK due to the intended goal of physical harm. There were 32 instances of attempted physical harm in this case, the crime is complex.

The lawyers in Boston, the FBI in Washington DC, and the police in Boston stated that due to the nature of the crime (which predominantly takes place in the US) it would have to be reported in the US embassy in London to a federal investigator.

The local police (police in London and Bournemouth, UK) refused to report it since it isn't a local crime.

It's an involved case of fraud with the intent of physical harm so it could only be communicated in person to a federal bureau investigator (which is also what the FBI in Boston stated, that I should rescind the evidence in person at the US embassy to a FBI investigator).

Due to my asylum status there is no way of going back to the US to report it to the federal investigators there. It is a form of terrorism so there is no way of avoiding it being reported.
